#### From Your President ...

"Choice"

I have been in hospital. I feel poorly; I make a medical appointment. Before it is over and without warning, I am in Urgent Care, then ambulance transport, and thence admitted to a hospital cardiac unit. Of course, there follow the tests without number, as one is wheeled from place to place. The constant poking and measuring at all hours of the day and night becomes part of my life routine.

At first, it seems surgery is not recommended, then a cautious evaluation that heart by-pass surgery could be attempted, though at relatively high risk. The choice becomes whether to try to live with diminished heart capacity or to go for "all or nothing" surgery—no definite positive answer is guaranteed by either course. I am deluged with tales of good and bad experiences by those who have been in similar situations. I decide to wait a bit and see how the recovery period goes. That decision at least gets me out of the hospital and into my own bed.

Despite the miracles of modern medicine we seem to hit the continuing quandary posed by choice-making with no definitive odds on either side of the equation. All we can do is choose as best we can, remembering ever it is our life and not that of the surgeon. Once a decision is made, then to abide content even as we may be made to realize that new developments can bring a similar choice anew.

Meanwhile, along with the reaffirmation of the dictum, "old age is not for sissies," I enjoy the respite and the wonder of each new day.

Doe Lockwood reports that Dick and Mary Weston-Jones are in Auckland New Zealand where Dick is doing an interim ministry. In March they'll be leading eco-spirituality tours co-sponsored by ANZUA (Australia New Zealand Unitarian Association) for North American UU's. The information is in their website at, www.wuurld.org. They also lead whale-watching tours.

In June they go to Alaska to lead three tours there before moving into their new home that they are building near Chapel Hill, N.C.—a shift from Arkansas to get to a place with better medical care (Duke Medical Center in Durham) for Mary.

Chuck Eddis has been in mail contact with Barbara Earl who suffers from spino cerebellar ataxia type 6, a fairly rare genetic disorder at the cellular level allowing too much calcium to enter the cerebellum. Joyce Smith will be going to Stockholm in December to attend the Nobel Prize awards where her former husband Vernon Smith is receiving half of the Nobel prize for Economics.

Gene Kreves, Minister Emeritus and Founder of the DuPage Unitarian Universalist Church in Naperville, Illinois, has a new book of poetry and prose out: The Hungry Fire: Poems Affirming the Strength of Our Humanity. It is a collection of 66 poems and several short prose pieces, some autobiographical, others reflecting the experiences of close associations, and still others that are responses to the turbulent political times of the 50's through the 80's. Skinner House has published a book of writings by Jack Hayward entitled *Through the Rose Window: Art, Myth, and the Religious Imagination.* The governing theme of the book is that works of art, though humanly made, sometimes transcend the verifiable meanings of human experience. Thus the rose window—a real one, above the altar of the First Unitarian Church of Chicago—polarizes into visible form and color the brilliance of the sun which is otherwise unbearable for direct contact with the eye. Just as astronomy and physics can give us partial knowledge of the unapproachable sun, so the arts, though finite and limited, can give us partial insight into the universal meanings of our lives. Jack views religion as one of the human arts. By its use of music, story, myth, and many visual and liturgical methods, religion expresses and establishes varieties of meanings and relationships to an infinite mystery. Accordingly, religion ought always to be liberal and never claim to be the final, imperial, last word—whether handed down from on high or up from below.

## Watch for Your UURMAPA Survey


The board of UURMAPA voted to apply for money from the Fund for Unitarian Universalism to mail out a questionnaire to all UU ministers and partners over 50 years of age to assess their plans and hopes for their retirement years, particularly concerning health and financial well-being and areas of interest and involvement. We decided to send the questionnaire to our current membership also. (Did you know that about three-fourths of our clergy are over 50!?)

This will give us a picture of you and those approaching retirement so that we can assess realistically the needs in the future and, if necessary, advocate for the means to meet those needs. Our concern is that our needs for the coming years may be greater than our resources to meet them, but we have no hard data to prove it one way of another. You will be receiving this questionnaire in January and are asked to fill it out as completely as possible and return it by March 1. All information will be kept confidential and only released as statistical data.
