I received a warm welcome at a pleasant lakeside setting with good food and the company of colleagues old and new; and though I thoroughly enjoyed the three days, I wondered, at some points, if the group was getting what it wanted and needed in a chaplaincy.

As it turned out, two members came to me with concerns they did not feel they could discuss with anyone else. One brought a personal and the other a professional concern, and both expressed appreciation for my being there and listening to them.

This information seems to have provided for the group a justification for its chaplaincy project. The program initiated by our Iroquois UUMA Chapter is one of great potential value and deserving to be both commended and supported.

## Some History of the Ongoing Ethical Guidelines Discussion

Regarding the UUMA Code where it pertains to the Retired, the concerns do have a longer history than was reported.

When I was VP of the UUMA Board with Harold Hadley as President he and I discussed the strong and angry language in The Code. We were also getting flack from ministers who were about to retire and understood that they must "leave town." The issues needed clarifying. UUA ignored the retired. New ministers were complaining about previous ministers interfering, or what they interpreted as interference. Some did, I'm sure. But the Code has some harsh language and still does.

The Western group, at my encouragement, drafted a statement "requesting" the UUMA Board to give the matter serious attention. They even prepared a statement that was presented as a UUMA Code for our members. Then a year or two later when I was presiding at the business meeting of the Northeast Conference a strong statement regarding the whole issue was drafted, voted and presented to the UURMA Board, to be passed on to the UUMA Exec.

There is a lot of history to this whole concern for the language in the Code and the stringent way the retired are to be dealt with if they do not follow the rules. I do think we should keep the matter before the UUMA in hopes that some day there will be a much better understanding and rapport in our midst.

Muriel Davies has accepted an unpaid position as advisor to the new Maryland church, The Sugarloaf Congregation. She celebrates her 90th birthday Nov. 16. Muriel was our Caring Network Contact Person in the Joseph Priestley District - South until recently.

A SPECIAL READ FOR US . . . . . . A MODERN PIONEER . . . . . . by Vi Kochendoerfer It's not only historic, but prophetic. Thirty years ago she was involved with social issues still with us today! Gays were best parishioners in Provincetown where she worried about the mixed up lives of children of the artists - an epidemic today. In Calgary she spoke of adults unclear in their basic values who could not pass on to youth a vital example for setting priorities in our changing world; and first hearing of unmarried couples living together, made "A Case for Trial Marriage," with pros and cons. During WWII in Tallahassee with ten percent Blacks in her group, she helped boys escape to Canada and got deferments, and was an AMA lobbyist to liberalize Florida abortion laws. She taught a course on "Death and Society" with Methodist and Lutheran clergy at Kent State; and while there she was an early promoter of the "About your Sexuality" program, which we're just now bringing out once again. 
