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

"Q. I've heard there was a new herbal flu remedy made from elderberries. Does it work? Is it safe?

"A. Elderberries have a long history as a folk remedy for coughs, colds and flu. Recently researchers identified the plant's specific antiviral properties and an immunologist Madeleine Momcuoglu, Ph.D., at the Hadassah University Medical Center in Jerusalem has developed a syrup and lozenge that contain the active ingredients. Called Sambucol, it's now sold as a dietary supplement in health food stores in the United States. Adults take either one tablespoon of syrup or one lozenge four times a day.

So, it may be that "our" Elderberries also contains some ingredients with antiviral properties. There's isolation and loneliness and indigency and depressions and despair and illness to be addressed.


Good Housekeeping says that Sambucol

FOLLOW-UPS

UUMAA Code of Professional Practice and Guidelines

The UURMA has submitted recommendations for changes in the Code and Guidelines relating to relationships between retired and emeritus ministers and settled ministers in congregations. Accompanying the recommendations was a suggestion that the specific recommendations be considered in the context of a more general discussion of changes that have occurred and are on going regarding the nature of ministry.

The UUMA Committee on Ministerial Guidelines and Code of Professional Practice has asked UUMA chapters to discuss these questions:

- 1. What is the role of a minister emeritus in a congregation? By whom and how should that determination be made?
- 2. What is the role of a retired minister who is a member of a church she or he has not served? By whom and how should that determination be made?
- 3. What are the appropriate collegial relationships between retired, emeritus, community, student and any other ministers who attend a church, and the incumbent minister(s) who serve the church? Who makes the determination about these ministers' relationship to the parish? Who can facilitate the conversations that need to take place to create understandings between colleagues?
- 4. What is the role of the congregation itself in determining these roles and relationships> Who should help the congregation understand or clarify these kinds of issues?
- 5. In light of your answers to 1-4, are there changes you think appropriate to our current Code and Guidelines?

UUMA chapters are urged to include retired ministers in such discussions. UURMA ministerial members are requested to be alert to opportunities to participate in discussing these concerns.
